Circle your answer to each of the following questions.

<b>+</b> Does the information come from someone with a good reputation?	<b>Yes</b> <b>No</b> <b>Not Sure</b>
<b>+</b> Does the person have some background in the topic (special training, education or experience)?	<b>Yes</b> <b>No</b> <b>Not Sure</b>
<b>+</b> Is the information well-presented (e.g., no mistakes in spelling or grammar)?	<b>Yes</b> <b>No</b> <b>Not Sure</b>
<b>-</b> Does the source include statements or promises that seem unbelievable or extreme without providing proof?	<b>Yes</b> <b>No</b> <b>Not Sure</b>
<b>-</b> Does the person have strong opinions that might affect the way he or she presents the information? Does he or she want you to think a certain way, regardless of other facts?	<b>Yes</b> <b>No</b> <b>Not Sure</b>



If you answered **Yes** to the positive questions (+) and **No** to the negative questions (-), your source is probably reliable.



If you answered **No** to the positive questions (+) and **Yes** to the negative questions (-), your source may not be reliable and you should look for a different one.



If you answered **Not Sure** to any of the questions, you should probably find out more about your source before you continue.
