


Rights and Responsibilities of Citizenship





Official Bilingualism

In 1969, Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau and his government brought in the *Official Languages Act*. This Act gave Canadians the legal right to speak French when receiving services from the federal government and the courts. Provinces also began to offer services in French. The Act was intended to provide equal opportunity for citizens who spoke either official language.

Majority
