The Web site contains reference information on such topics as globalization, free-market economics and anti-globalization.

Enter a search term (e.g., globalization) in the search box on the left-hand side of the screen and click on Go to access an article related to the search term or click on Search to access a complete list of related articles. Scroll down to read the complete article and click on highlighted words within the text to access additional related information.

The Web site contains *Freedom in the World* survey—an annual comparative assessment of the state of political rights and civil liberties in 193 countries and 15 related and disputed territories.

Select a year from the drop-down menu to access specific information. Click on data and reports to access a world map showing how countries rank globally in relation to freedom. Scroll down and click on Subcategory Scores to access a chart comparing world freedom in different countries. Click on Country Reports to access reports for individual countries.
