Using Social Stories



- Social stories combine language, routines and social expectations on a personal level to provide a relevant and accurate orientation to a particular social situation.
- They can guide and direct a student's response and can support the development of increased self-awareness and selfmanagement.

To develop social stories:

that situation.

- identify a target behaviour or problem situation which has or may occur, or a skill to be developed
- consider student's developmental level and use positive language, print size and concepts appropriate for that student
- write from the student's point of view in present or future tense; e.g., "I will ..."
- develop a specific step-by-step description of what the student needs to do in this situation
- use photos and pictures and, if possible, have students illustrate and/or co-write their own stories

To use social stories in the classroom:

- read and review the story with the student frequently and in different contexts
- teach the skill embedded in the social story directly and create opportunities to practise.
